Band Fees

2020 planning

School Community Charter

The school community charter was released earlier this year. Its focus is collaborative, respectful communication:

Collaborative – working in partnership to promote student learning;

Respectful – treating each other with respect and fairness;

Communication – communicating in a positive and constructive manner.

Respectful communication is a right in all workplaces. Staff have a right to feel safe and respected at work. Every member of staff in our school works hard to ensure all students are known, valued and cared for. Occasionally, we receive communication that can be interpreted as aggressive or even dismissive of the effort that our teachers and other staff members go to for the students. I am always concerned for the wellbeing of my staff when this happens. Every member of staff comes to school each day to focus on teaching and learning. Issues arising from communications received have the potential to move the focus away from the students and the learning program. I would request that if there is a problem or complaint that you make an appointment with the teacher, an assistant principal or myself and have a conversation. Most issues can be dealt with through collaborative, respectful communication.

Pedestrian safety

We are all aware that Grose Rd is a very busy road, particularly at the start and end of the school day.

Recently, our crossing supervisor, Mr O has noticed that some parents and some children are taking risks by not crossing Grose Rd at the designated crossing. Children have been seen popping out from between parked cars further up the road.

In the interests of the safety of all - students, parents and motorists, please use the crossing, and please reinforce this expectation with your child/ren.

SCHOOL PARLIAMENT

Hello students, parents and teachers.

This week Faulconbridge Public Parliament was in session.

This week there was only one motion passed in parliament but it was potentially a saving motion. Social Justice Minister Jasmine Vogel tabled a motion for a school walkathon to raise money for the local cancer council.

Students would seek sponsorship for each kilometer walked. On the day there would also be a silly hat competition. For the competition, students would make a hat at home and bring it in. A judging panel would decide who wins. No prize currently exists. The idea proved very popular with parliament members as only around one or two people were not in favour.



During Other Business Thomson (term 1 and 2's Parliamentary Speaker) made an emotional speech about the environment. Mr Thomson spoke about his concerns for global warming and the use of plastics in our school. Mr Thomson talked about how his family helps reduce waste at his home and how students can be part of the solution to global warming. Mr Thomson said "1 + 1 + 1 + 1 + 1, etc, and add up to billions," meaning everyone needs to play their part to save the world from giant demons who try to destroy the world with pollution. Finally, Mr Thomson made a reply to the sound of kids writing notes on their paper, "don't even get me started on paper!" he said.

During question time backbencher Caden Thirling asked the minister for Student Welfare Willow Hookings if they were going to let year sixes have a say in the preparations for Year 6 farewell celebrations. Willow replied, "I have not thought about that because it is a long way away but I will now give it consideration". This "small" moment in this week's parliament could end up being a very big moment for how the year six's year ends.

Prime Minister Liam O'Loughlin was absent.

Question time included questions from backbencher Jeremiah Hill, Prime Minister Olivia Mountain, Minister for student welfare Willow Hookings and Minister for the Environment Lachlan Henderson.

Mr Smith became the new speaker. Mr Thomson had to become assistant speaker to help Mr. Smith as he hadn't been speaker before.
