Principal's Report

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

STAFF CHANGE

Mr Smith has indicated that he will be taking leave next semester. I would like to thank Mr Smith for the great start he has given 5/6S this year and hope that he enjoys his leave. I know that he will be missed by the students of 5/6S, other students and of course the staff and parents.

I have invited Mrs Serena Goodridge to join our Faulconbridge PS teaching team and teach 5/6S for terms 3 & 4. Mrs Goodridge is a highly experienced Stage 3 teacher, and we look forward to working with her this year. Mrs Goodridge will be visiting us at the end of next week to meet 5/6S and work with the Stage 3 team to plan for Term 3.

TEACHER PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES

From time to time, teachers need to be released from class responsibilities to engage in professional activities. This can include professional learning, data collection and analysis, planning teaching and learning programs, and engaging with colleagues across schools. Over the next two weeks teachers will be engaged in these activities. We intend to maintain a calm, organised learning environment for every class during this period.

THE AUSTRALIAN EARLY DEVELOPMENT CENSUS (AEDC)

Along with the activities above, Kindergarten teachers will be completing the Australian Early Development Census over the next two weeks. They will be released from class to do this.

The Australian Early Development Census (AEDC) is a population-based measure of how children in Australia have developed by the time they start their first year of full-time school. Teachers complete a research tool, the Australian version of the Early Development Instrument (the Instrument) for each child in their class. The Instrument measures five key areas, or domains, of early childhood development:

- physical health and wellbeing
- social competence
- emotional maturity
- language and cognitive skills (school-based) and
- communication skills and general knowledge

These areas are closely linked to the predictors of adult health, education and social outcomes.

The Council of Australian Governments (COAG) has endorsed the AEDC as a national progress measure of early childhood development in Australia.

SEMESTER 1 REPORTS

On Friday, 18th June you will receive your child's report. The report however only tells part of the story. It is the conversation you have with your child's teacher that will put it all into perspective. I encourage all students to spend some time reflecting on their approach and application to their learning so far this year, and to consider how they might focus their efforts for the remainder of the year.

Interviews are scheduled between teachers and families in **Week 10 of Term 2**. You will be able to book a parent teacher interview online. A note for parents outlining the steps to book an interview will be sent home early next week. It is a very simple process; please follow the supplied instructions.



Principal's Report cont'd

At parent-teacher interviews we encourage parents to be actively involved in their child's education and welcome discussions between teachers and parents so that everyone is working together.

A parent-teacher interview enables you to:

- · discuss how your child is progressing, both academically and socially
- · see examples of your child's work
- · get to know your child's teacher
- · stay informed about plans for your child's future learning.

Please remember that these interviews are only 10 minutes in duration. The focus of the interview is the report. If you have other issues to discuss, please make a separate time to meet with the teacher.

REPORTING STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT USING A-E

The A to E grading scale lets teachers report student academic achievements at any point in time using clear standards. As teachers, we make a professional on-balance judgement to decide which grade best matches the standards your chid/ren have achieved, based on assessment information we have collected throughout the year. An on-balance judgement does not just focus on a single piece of work. Teachers weigh up the assessment information that they have collected for their students **up to that point in time**. That information comes from both formal assessment activities and informal observations and are built up over time and in different situations.

I encourage all parents and caregivers to visit The Assessment Resource Centre website (the ARC) as it provides work samples and other information to help you see the standards associated with each grade.

Isn't a 'C' a disappointing result? No, it is not at all. It is important to remember that if your child receives a 'C' on the report card it indicates that their learning is on track and they are achieving the state-wide standard that is expected of them at the time of reporting. In the past, a 'C' in some schools might have meant the child was performing below the standard expected. This is no longer the case.

LATE ARRIVALS AT SCHOOL

Throughout this term the school has been required to submit daily attendance numbers each day. As I walk around to each class at the beginning of the day, it is quite noticeable that we a have a large number of students arriving late to school. Today it was over 20 students who arrived late to school. This is unsettling for the child arriving late as it draws attention to them. It interrupts the teaching and the learning of the rest of the class who have already started their day. It also creates additional congestion in the front office and interrupts the work of the office staff.

Please remember that school starts at 8:55am and do your best to have your child/ren arrive on time. Aiming to arrive ten minutes before the bell (8:45am), will allow your child/ren to connect with classmates and line up together when the bell goes. This makes for a much smoother start to the day for everyone.

ENROLMENT POLICY

With many new enrolments beginning to happen for Kindergarten 2022, it is timely to review the changes made to the Enrolment Policy. In July 2019, the Department of Education revised the Enrolment Policy for all Schools.

The Education Act 1990 ensures that every student has a place at their local school. Every school was given an enrolment cap based on the school's permanent accommodation, i.e. classrooms. This cap identifies the capacity of the school to accept enrolments from students who do not live in our local area. Each school must also maintain a number of enrolment places (a buffer) for local students who move and may need to enrol during the year. For this reason, a school will not take non-local enrolments once they reach their buffer, unless there is exceptional circumstances.

Currently Faulconbridge PS is well over our buffer, and we can only accept students who are within our school intake area. This may affect the enrolment of younger siblings of non-local students who are due to enrol in the future.

There is now a 100-point residential address check that must happen to confirm the family lives within the school's designated intake area. Parents will need to provide documents to verify the child's current address. If you know someone who is planning to move to our area and enrol at Faulconbridge PS, please ask them to contact the school to discuss their plans. Due to the enrolment cap, we cannot accept an enrolment for a child who may move to the area in the future. We can only accept enrolment once the move has taken place and we have proof of their residential address.

NOT EVERY ACT OF MEANNESS IS BULLYING

This is the title of an article I read recently and felt that it was important to share some of the key points:

- One of our jobs is to help children and young people to interpret events proportionally. However, in recent times, I have seen a shift involving the wrong application of words like trauma, depression and bullying. When these very meaningful words are misused, their misuse can result in unwanted consequences. What might be the 'unkind' behaviour of another may, in fact, not be 'bullying'.
- According to 'Bullying No Way', the National Australian definition of bullying is: "an ongoing misuse of power in relationships through repeated verbal, physical and/or social behaviour that causes physical and/or psychological harm. It can involve an individual or a group misusing their power over one or more persons. Bullying can happen in person or online, and it can be obvious (overt) or hidden (covert)... Single incidents and conflict or fights between equals, whether in person or online, are not defined as bullying".
- The key terms in the definition of bullying is 'misuse of power' and 'repeated'. The key terms in the definition of what is <u>not</u> bullying is 'between equals' and while conflicts or mean and hurtful behaviour may upset a child tremendously, by labelling the mean behaviour 'bullying' we may be disempowering children.
- It is important for children to understand the difference between someone being insensitive or mean and what constitutes bullying behaviour because being able to successfully resolve and navigate these situations is a huge step in their emotional growth and maturity. If the situation is deemed to be simply mean or hurtful behaviour it is important not to over-play this through misleading terminology (i.e. bullying) and offer ways for the child to address and resolve this themselves.



Principal's Report cont'd

- Parents who react too defensively for their child at every negative encounter with their child's peers may be doing
 more harm than good. In later years the child may not have the necessary tools to independently handle conflict and
 may feel 'victimised' in situations that don't go their way, potentially causing social engagement and relationship
 difficulties in later life.
- Calling every act of meanness bullying sends an unhealthy message: It says to kids, 'You're fragile. You can't handle it if anyone is even slightly unkind to you.' As these children grow older, they demonstrate less resilience, sometimes publicly. They may get more easily and deeply upset about perceived offenses, including situations that are unpleasant, but aren't really bullying. Beyond stunting their emotional maturity, the heightened reactions may have negative social consequences, as peers respond by disengaging from them.




The team lost their first game, won their second by 2 tries, won

Valuing the teaching profession — an independent inquiry

What every parent and carer needs to know about the Gallop inquiry

The first inquiry into the work of NSW public school teachers since 2004 has just handed down its final report. The Inquiry, headed by former WA Premier Dr Geoff Gallop, has recommended major changes to the salaries and working conditions of teachers.

The report states the changes were urgently needed to help address teacher shortages, improve teaching and ensure we can recruit enough teachers to cater for rapidly increasing enrolments in public schools.

Four key findings

- 1. The inquiry found the dedication and commitment of teachers remains high but workloads have become unsustainable. All aspects of the work of teachers have been altered due to constant policy changes, advances in technology, curriculum changes and the increasingly complex needs of students. Teachers now have heavy administration workloads outside the classroom as well, including data collection and reporting and compliance work. On average, teachers work 55 hours a week.
- 2. Salaries of teachers have fallen compared with other professions. While the work of teachers has become harder and more complex, their salaries are now significantly below the average of all professions. This dangerous combination is leading to recruitment and retention issues and making it more difficult to attract the high achievers we need for the future.
- **3. Student numbers in NSW are set to increase and teacher shortages must be addressed.** The inquiry found teacher shortages are an issue across NSW and said this had to be addressed ahead of a record increase in enrolments 200,000 extra students expected over the next 20 years.
- **4.Teachers need more time for collaborative work, planning and preparation.** The time teachers have each week outside the classroom has not increased since the 1950s for secondary teachers and the 1980s for primary teachers. The inquiry found teachers need more dedicated time to prepare and collaborate with their colleagues, particularly given the increase in the number of students with higher needs.

Recommendations for change

Increase the preparation time teachers have. The number of hours outside the classroom should increase from two to four per week in primary schools and there should be a reduction of two hours in the face-to-face teaching hours of secondary teachers. This time should be dedicated to assessment, lesson planning and collaboration.

Reset salaries. An increase of between 10 and 15 per cent in 2022 and 2023 to recognise the increase in teachers' skills and responsibilities, help overcome shortages and recruit the additional teachers needed to cope with enrolment growth.

Lift the number of school counsellors. An urgent increase in counsellor numbers to reduce waiting times and address rising student mental health issues. There should be one counsellor for every 500 students by 2023.

Improve staffing levels. Permanent teacher numbers should be increased to overcome the shortages of casuals. The excessive use of temporary teacher employment should be addressed. Support services, previously provided by the Department of Education in areas such as curriculum implementation, student welfare and behaviour and special education, should be restored.

Investing in teachers. Acting on the recommendations of the Inquiry will help improve teaching and learning in NSW public schools. It will also make teaching more attractive so we can keep our best teachers in the classroom and recruit the additional ones required to meet rapidly increasing enrolments.

These changes are an investment in our future that will pay off for our kids and our country
